Isolomzi Outreach Program

Alex Smith (E'17) and I have been part of an outreach team which has travelled to Isolomzi Secondary School in the Transkei for the past 3 years.

The programme was started by ex Rondebosch maths teacher, Rowan Harmuth, Marion Wasdell. Every year, a group of students from Rondebosch Boys High, Rustenburg Girls' High and Springfield

travel to Isolomzi Secondary School in the June/July holidays for about two weeks to tutor Grade 11s and Grade 12s in Maths, Maths Literacy, Accounting and Life Sciences.

This initiative has been life changing, not only for the

students of Isolomzi (who achieved a 100% pass rate for the first time in 2017), but also for the students from Cape Town, who learn so much from the students and their community. Each day we travel half an hour to the school from where we are staying, to teach the students at their school. The trip is also focussed on providing help to the community, as we support a local old age home by providing them with clothing, blankets and other essentials. The trip is truly a cultural experience as well, as we have the opportunity to visit a local sangoma, tour the Transkei Gates, and interact with the village children and their families.

Alex and I first went on the Isolomzi trip in Grade 11 and then again in Grade 12, and it will forever remain one of the highlights of my school career. Despite being out of school, Alex and I really

wanted to go back to Transkei, so this year we went as "Old Girls" and took up more responsibility, helping plan the trip, and also teaching Grade 11 Maths.

This program is extremely close to my heart and I have built many friendships with the students at Isolomzi whom I look forward to seeing every year. The students at this school are truly inspirational, with a hunger to learn and to succeed. Provided with the right resources, these students are be able to achieve anything they set their mind to. Seeing their passion and willingness to learn and succeed, despite the obstacles which they face, is truly humbling and inspiring. I couldn't imagine spending my holiday any other way, and am hoping to go back as an old girl again next year. I'd like to encourage everyone to watch the recently made short documentary about the program, "Ukongeza Ithemba - Adding Hope" - a film by Matthew Eaton, on YouTube. Achievements

Congratulations go to Kim Buchholtz (E'00), who was nominated in the Mail and Guardian's 2018 Top Young South Africans (Health Section).

We are proud of her achievements since leaving Rustenburg and wish her well in her research and career.

She grew up in a physically active family, and is a cyclist and runner in her spare time.

Kim completed her BSc in Physiotherapy at UCT, and is a lecturer in the Physiotherapy Department. Earlier this year she gave up her physiotherapy practice to focus on academics.

In 2014 Kim worked as a volunteer physiotherapist for the Australian Blind T20 Cricket Team, in the tournament which was hosted in Cape Town. She was appointed head physiotherapist for the team during for the 2017 tour of India, and then again in 2018 for the tour to the United Arab Emirates.

Kim writes:

I am currently doing my PhD in Physiotherapy/ Exercise Science and Sports Medicine, investigating injuries in cycling, specifically focussing on multi-stage mountain biking events at this stage, broadening eventually to all types of cycling, to improve cycling safety.



I am also a research assistant on a study with Monash University in Melbourne, Australia, assessing rehabilitation for Achilles tendinopathy, and looking at the viability of 'tele-rehabilitation', i.e. rehab from a distance via video call. This holds particular interest for me when considering the lack of resources in South Africa, and how we may be able to advance rehab services into under-resourced/distant areas.

I am currently supervising 8 masters students (in Exercise and Sports Physiotherapy), who are all doing research in the monitoring of training loads in a range of sports (school boy rugby, triathlon, cycling, dancing/ballet) as well as motivations or barriers to physical activity in a South African setting.

Being a past member of Earth Children and RCL, I am grateful and awestruck at the eco-work that has been implemented and improved upon in the past five years, in and outside the classroom.

Naturally, the biggest benefit to this is that an appreciation and sense of responsibility towards

the environment at a school level will prime young minds for greater responsibility beyond school.

Being on the other side of the staffroom door also gave me a sense of appreciation for the hard work that goes on behind the scenes by the staff. The fact that they remembered who I was, also speaks to the sincerity with which the teachers perform their meaningful work and treat the girls as much more than mere numbers on a class list.

It is good to see the policy changes demonstrating that communal success comes about when pluralism takes precedence over protocol. This is only befitting of one of the top schools in a transformative South Africa.

Although there are changes at the school, its principles and values on which it is based remains the same, and I couldn't have asked for a better foundation."

Tessa Brown (E'05), who has been the Maths Literacy Teacher at RGHS for the past four years,


has decided to start a business venture of her own, which will reflect the more creative side of her nature.
