E63 Daphne Nunneley 15 April 1945 - 27 May 2024

Daphne was a Rustybug from Grade R to Matric and then taught at Rustenburg Junior for 17 years, from 1994 to 2011! She was a LEGEND in the truest sense of the word. Daphne remembered being sent to the headmistress in Standard 1 (Grade 3) because she could not spell “mountain” and her punishment, after Miss Orton had shouted at her, was to stand with her face to the wall while the other girls went out to break!

In 2005, Daphne was appointed head of Sport and Extramurals at RGJS and organised many wonderful events. Daphne had many accolades in her life, one was receiving the KFM Coolest Teacher Award!

Daphne was a loving mother to Andrew and Robyn, the proudest grandmother to Morgan, Sasha and Jack, mother-in-law to Debbie and Liane and a friend to so many. Many current RGJS teachers shared their favourite memories of Daphne;

“Daphne, a beloved teacher with an infectious laugh and a love for warthogs, brightened lives with her joy and always remembered to spread birthday cheer. She will be deeply missed. - Liesl Ludik”

“Daphne was one of a kind. How can you not admire someone who loves warthogs? She was the zest in the school and a character of note, someone who cared for the girls and left a legacy. Go well, Daphne. - Jenny Wates”

“My favourite memory of Daphs was her incredible parties at her home, her infectious laugh, her messages every birthday of mine, her love of a glass of wine, her kindness, her fair and equitable leadership style, and her warthog obsession. E71 Spotlight on Alison Mills (nee Stewart)

Alison Stewart, a distinguished writer and journalist, grew up in Cape Town, South Africa and attended Rustenburg Girls' High School. Now based in Sydney, Australia, Alison has authored nine novels, including seven for young readers and two for adults. Her works have been translated into multiple languages and have earned critical acclaim, with three shortlisted for literary awards.

Her young adult dystopian novel, "Days Like This," published by Penguin Australia, was a finalist in the 2010 YA Amazon Breakthrough Novel Award. Her debut adult novel, "Born into the Country," was also shortlisted for South Africa's AA Mutual Life Vita Young Writers' Award.

Alison's non-fictional narrative, "Cold Stone Soup," about growing up during apartheid in South Africa, won the Fellowship of Australian Writers 2013 National Literary Awards, the Jim Hamilton Award for a non-fiction manuscript and was a runner-up for the Varuna Writers' House Scholarship.

Travel journalism is another of Alison's passions. She has contributed to Fairfax Media's Sydney Morning Herald Traveller and Melbourne Age Traveller for the past decade, writing stories from over 50 countries. Her acclaimed travel piece, "Snails in the Mist," which details a walk on New Zealand's Milford Track, won first place in the Lane Cove Literary Awards 2019 travel story category.

Alison collaborates with her husband, Rob Mills, a Walkley Award-winning journalist. They share a love for hiking, cycling, and engaging with diverse cultures. Rob's travel writings are featured alongside Alison's in "Rob Mills' Travel Stories."

Alison continues to work on her memoir while maintaining a robust presence in travel journalism. Alison and Rob have two adult children, Georgia and Angus.



E69 Betty Baerecke (nee Caplan) shares Rustybug escapade

“As I look back on my school days in the 1950’s, one particular memory never fails to bring a smile to my face - a mischievous escapade shared with my closest friend and forever etched in my mind.

It was during our Sub-A years, that my friend and I devised a playful plan. We agreed to meet in the cloakroom during morning classes. As I slipped into the cloakroom, Little did I know, my friend lay in wait, ready to spring a surprise that would leave me startled and we burst out with laughter. With a sudden leap from her hiding spot, she caught me completely off guard. Our laughter, however, was short-lived as the sound of heavy footsteps heralded the arrival of a stern teacher. She instructed us to report to her at break time, my friend and I spent the remainder of the morning nervously awaiting our fate. Break time arrived, and with it, our punishment - a scene straight out of a bygone era. We were bound to an oak tree in full view of our peers during the entire break time. That was the punishment in those days.

As I reflect on this memory, I'm reminded of the innocence and spontaneity of childhood. Though the world may have changed, and disciplinary methods evolved, the laughter and happy moments shared with my friend remain as precious to me now as they were all those years ago.”

E90 Jill Jurgens (nee Nicholls) remembers Rustenburg

Penned by Jill Nicholls E90, this reflection on Rustenburg Girls' High School captures the enduring essence of cherished memories.

“The 90th birthday celebration, where free ice creams brought joy akin to an early Christmas, stands out as a testament to the school's vibrant spirit. Unexpected events such as bomb scares leading to impromptu theatre outings, fostered camaraderie amidst uncertainty. I remember navigating the school's strict traditions, from meticulously maintaining hats to facing the stern discipline of teachers like Mrs. Dugmore, who instilled the values of discipline and accountability.”

As Rustenburg continues to shape future generations, Nicholls' words serve as a poignant reminder of the school's rich legacy, woven with threads of camaraderie, resilience, and tradition.

E03 Azra Isaacs : A Journey of Musical Excellence and Community Engagement

Azra Isaacs, an alumnae of Rustenburg Girls' High School, has built an impressive career in classical music since matriculating in 2003. She holds a Bachelor of Music and Master of Music degree in viola performance from the University of Cape Town's South African College of Music (SACM). Joining the Cape Town Philharmonic Orchestra (CTPO) in 2009, Isaacs became Associate Principal Viola in 2017. She also teaches viola and string repertoire studies at SACM.

Returning to her alma mater to perform was particularly special for Isaacs. "It felt very special to be back performing at my former school," she recalls. "I have such fond memories of performing in that very hall with the Junior school orchestra." Isaacs participates in the CTPO's outreach education program which brings classical music to young learners. A highlight was performing Sergei Prokofiev's 'Peter and the Wolf,' where each instrument represents a character in the story and makes classical music engaging for students.

Isaacs' journey from student to professional musician and educator is inspiring. The community engagement exemplifies the transformative power of music and ensures that the tradition of classical music will thrive for future generations.



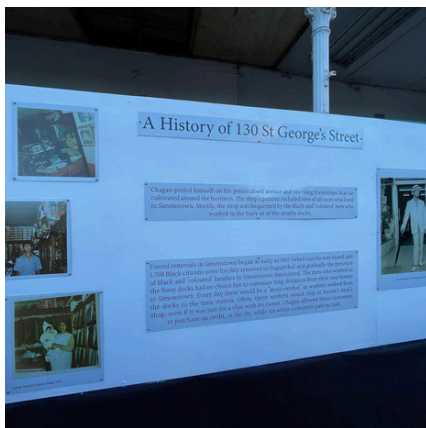
E10 Sonya Solanki : Curating History and Heritage in Simonstown

Sonya Solanki, an accomplished researcher and independent curator, has a rich background rooted in her school activities which included Jazz Band, Orchestra, Wind Band, Guitar Ensemble, Choir, and the School Magazine Committee. This diverse involvement has clearly influenced her multifaceted approach to curating and research.

Solanki opened a public exhibition in Simonstown titled "A History of 130 St George's Street: The Simonstown Clothing Store (1962-1998)." This exhibition, hosted in association with the Simon's Town Museum, is based on her Master's thesis which delves into the history of her late grandfather's men's outfitters.

The exhibition sheds light on the store's operation from 1962 to 1998 and uncovers various threads of Simonstown's turbulent history. It explores the multicultural nature of the town before Apartheid's forced removals and highlights how clothing served as a symbol of identity for the shop's diverse clientele. Solanki's work demonstrates how familial and collective memory can offer meaningful contributions to South African heritage and reveal multiple narratives from a single entry point.

Solanki's dedication to uncovering and presenting these stories underscores the importance of remembering and understanding our shared past through personal and collective lenses.

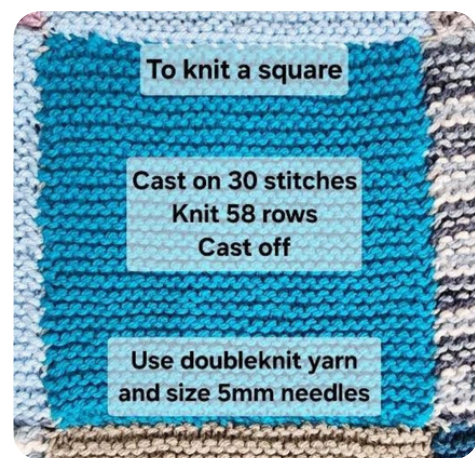
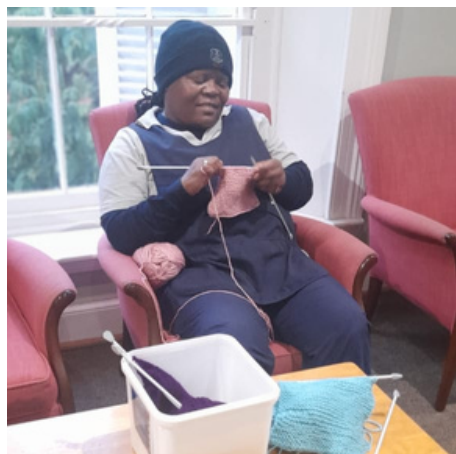
A Heartfelt Thank You to Our Knitting and Crocheting Community
