Ms Margaret Thomson: A Life of Principle and Service

Ms Margaret Thomson, born on 2 February 1917 in Cape Town, devoted her life to education and community service. She grew up in Uitenhage and attended Riebeek College Girls' High School before studying mathematics and science at Rhodes University and then completed her teaching diploma.

Her teaching career began at St John's College in Umtata and later at Ellerslie Girls' High School. She was appointed Headmistress of Rustenburg Girls' High School at just 35, an unusually young age that caused concern at the time. She quickly proved herself to be principled, disciplined and deeply committed to her pupils.

As Headmistress, she was both fierce and fair. She introduced innovative grading methods and delivered memorable speeches before sports events, reminding girls: "Don't gloat if you win, be gracious if you lose." Strongly opposed to apartheid, she quietly supported families of alumnae who came into conflict with the security police, showing courage during a time of fear.

Beyond the school, she contributed to the Cape Peninsula Organisation for the Aged (CPOA) and was an honorary member of the Soroptimists, a global women's organisation advocating for human rights. She also supported many charities, reflecting her generous spirit.

Ms Thomson loved music, theatre, reading and especially cricket, which she could watch for days. She adored her dogs and her first was Shadow which was known to follow her through the corridors of Rustenburg. She lived at Erinville throughout her tenure.

Remembered as strict yet compassionate, she had a gift for listening and a remarkable memory for alumnae names and faces. She inspired loyalty and respect in equal measure.

Ms Thomson retired from Rustenburg Girls' High School after a distinguished career and passed away on 23 June 2005, leaving behind a legacy of integrity, courage and care.

E36 Prof. Frances Rix Ames (1920–2002)

A Life Dedicated to Activism and Equality

Rustenburg alumnus Professor Frances Rix Ames (E36) is remembered as a pioneering doctor, academic and fearless activist whose life's work left an indelible mark on South Africa's medical and human rights landscape.

Born in Pretoria in 1920 and raised in Cape Town, Frances overcame a difficult childhood marked by poverty and illness. She matriculated from Rustenburg before studying medicine at the University of Cape Town and graduated in 1942. A trailblazer, she became the first woman to earn a Doctor of Medicine degree from UCT and later served as Head of Neurology at Groote Schuur Hospital.

While her medical career was distinguished, it was her unflinching commitment to human rights that defined her legacy. Prof. Ames was deeply disturbed by the medical profession's complicity in apartheid abuses, particularly in the death of activist Steve Biko in 1977. When the South African Medical and Dental Council exonerated the doctors involved, she took the courageous step of challenging the decision in court at great personal and professional risk. Her persistence led to accountability being enforced, a landmark moment for medical ethics in South Africa.

Her advocacy extended beyond Biko's case. She supported political prisoners, fought for ethical independence in medicine and campaigned for the medical use of cannabis decades before it became widely accepted. For her courage, she was awarded South Africa's highest civilian honour, the Order of the Star of South Africa, by President Nelson Mandela in 1999.

Prof. Ames remained a teacher, mentor, and practising doctor well into retirement. She passed away on 11 November 2002 and is remembered not only for her medical brilliance, but for her unwavering stand against injustice. Her life is a testament to the power of speaking truth to authority, an inspiration to all Rustenburg alumnae.

E56 Mary Rose Berrisford (Trainor), also known as Merrilee

A Journey of Purpose and Leadership

For Mary Rose, Rustenburg has been a lifelong anchor. She often says, "Rustenburg has followed me everywhere." Her 1956 classmates remain dear friends, gathering for "fabulous reunions" that often supported school projects, from scholarships to the memorial bench for Miss Thomson. She shared music, travel and countless memories with friends like Charmian Plummer, Janet Wolpe, Peggy Wynne and others. Later, during her teaching years in the 1990's, colleagues such as June Sacks, Simone de Clercq and Jane Moodie became part of her second circle of friends.

After achieving a BSc in Chemistry at UCT (where she captained hockey), Mary Rose taught at Wynberg GHS before moving to California with her husband, Peter. Returning to Cape Town, she balanced raising four children with a teaching career. She taught at the Athlone Training Centre, which trained women of colour as pre-school teachers during apartheid.

In 1989, she joined the staff of Rustenburg, teaching Biology until 1998. She co-created the school's permanent pond and wetland, led innovative cross-curricular trips such as the Glen Lyon project and served on the School Committee. Beyond teaching, she served on the Rustenburg Old Girls' Committee where she edited the Alumnae Newsletter for over a decade and was instrumental in linking generations through news and memory.

Mary Rose's ties to Rustenburg span generations. The members of the wider family are **Aunt Billie Foster** (E35), Aunt by marriage, **Clare Cullis**. All the matrics from the 60s; The daughters to **Clare Cullis**, **Muffy Jeffery, Betsey Joubert and Charmian Wightman**. **Eleanor Quinton (Tindale), Katharine Robertson, Sister Jean Cohen (Trainor)**, Sister-in-law **Yolande Trainor (Ahrens)** Her daughters **Fiona Berrisford** (E89), **Alison Berrisford (E93,) Robyn Cullis (E95) and Sally Trainor (E88)**.

Since 2005, she and Peter have lived in Betty's Bay, continuing to host friends and nurture connections. Reflecting on her work, she once wrote: "It has been a great experience to be immersed in the Rustenburg family, so much accomplished, so many links, above all a web of special friendships and ties."









E72 Dr Lucy Linley (1954–2025)



Born in Cape Town in 1954, Lucy Linley attended Rustenburg Girls' High School, matriculating in 1972. She went on to study medicine at the University of Cape Town, graduating with her MBChB in 1979.

Between 1980 and 1984, Lucy gained broad experience as a junior doctor across medicine, surgery, obstetrics, paediatrics and emergency medicine. She then trained as a paediatrician on the UCT hospital circuit, later specialising in neonatology. Her career was devoted to the Metro West region of Cape Town, where she served the community through her work at Mowbray Maternity Hospital (MMH).

Lucy became Head of the Neonatal Service at MMH in 2000, a position she held with distinction until her retirement in 2019. She was also a senior lecturer at UCT in Neonatal Medicine, shaping the knowledge and compassion of countless UCT medical students and midwives working in maternal and neonatal care.

Beyond her professional legacy, Lucy remained deeply connected to Rustenburg. In 2023, she was the first alumnae speaker in our Shift Mentorship Programme, which has since grown into an annual tradition of alumnae engagement with learners. Lucy passed away on 23 August 2025 after a courageous battle with cancer. She will be remembered for her remarkable spirit, her dedication to serving others and her lasting impact on the lives of both her patients and students.

E81 Debora PattaHonouring A Fearless Voice for Truth



Debora Patta (E81), an award-winning investigative journalist and Senior Foreign Correspondent for *CBS News*, was born in Zimbabwe in 1964. Debora moved to South Africa in 1976 and matriculated from RGHS in 1981. She went on to complete a Bachelor of Social Sciences at the University of Cape Town before beginning her career as a political activist, teaching literacy in Cape Town's squatter camps. In 1990, she transitioned into journalism, first freelancing for the *BBC* and later joining *Radio 702*, where she rose to become news editor.

In 1998, Debora joined *e.tv*, becoming one of the country's most recognisable broadcast journalists. She anchored news, served as editor-in-chief and created the hard-hitting current affairs programme *3rd Degree*, known for its uncompromising interviews and fearless reporting.

Since 2013, she has worked as a foreign correspondent for *CBS News*, covering some of the world's most urgent stories: the Ebola crisis, the Chibok schoolgirls' kidnapping, child labour in African industries, the famine in South Sudan, the COVID-19 pandemic and most recently, the ongoing war in Gaza. Her reporting has consistently shed light on injustice, giving a platform to those whose voices are often silenced.

Debora's many accolades include the Vodacom Women in the Media Award (2009), CEO Magazine's Most Influential Women in Business and Government (2010) and an Emmy nomination with the CBS team in 2015. Bold, uncompromising and committed to truth, Debora Patta exemplifies the courage and integrity that Rustenburg seeks to instill in every learner.

E96 Louise Carver

A Global Voice in Music



Rustenburg Girls' High School is proud to honour Louise Carver (E96), an internationally acclaimed folk rock singer-songwriter and pianist whose music has touched audiences across South Africa and the world.

Born in Cape Town in 1979, Louise began playing piano at the age of 11 and signed her first recording contract at just 15. While still a learner at Rustenburg, she released her debut single, *It Don't Matter (1996)*, which topped campus charts and climbed to number three on the national Top 40. By 18, she had released her first full-length album, *Mirrors and Windows (1998)*.

Louise went on to study at the University of Cape Town, earning an Honours degree in Politics, Philosophy and Economics in 2002, balancing her academic career with her passion for music. Over the years, she has released a string of successful albums, including *Silent Scream* (2005), *Saved by the Moonlight* (2007) and *Hanging in the Void* (2016).

Her talent extends beyond South African borders. Collaborating with international artists, she has achieved global recognition, most notably with her singles *Sunrise* (2016) and *Crazy Enough* (2018), both produced with DJ Joe Bermudez, which reached number one on the U.S. Billboard Dance Club Songs chart.

With her distinctive voice, heartfelt songwriting and fearless blending of genres, Louise has become one of South Africa's most celebrated performers. She continues to tour internationally and inspire new generations of musicians.

Louise Carver's journey from the music rooms of Rustenburg to global stages is a testament to the power of passion, perseverance, and creativity.

E03 Hannah Hussey

Innovating Primary Healthcare Research



Rustenburg Girls' High School proudly celebrates alumna Hannah Hussey (E03), a visionary leader in public health whose work is transforming primary healthcare delivery in South Africa.

Hannah is the Director of the Cape Town Surveillance through Healthcare Action Research Project (C-SHARP) HDSS, an innovative urban health and demographic surveillance system. Operating in the communities of Bishop Lavis and Nomzamo, C-SHARP integrates research seamlessly into community-oriented primary healthcare, providing a shared resource for local stakeholders. The project is a consortium of institutions, including the City of Cape Town, the Universities of Cape Town, Stellenbosch and the Western Cape, the South African Medical Research Council and the Human Sciences Research Council.

Through C-SHARP, all households in defined areas are regularly assessed to monitor births, deaths, migration and health trends. This evidence-based system enables researchers to understand how health issues affect communities, assess the accessibility and effectiveness of services, and embed targeted studies to improve care. Under Hannah's leadership, this work is strengthening primary healthcare delivery for low-income communities to ensure services are more effective and accessible.

Hannah balances this groundbreaking research with her roles as a mother, sister, friend and advocate for persons living with HIV. Her dedication, expertise and compassion exemplify the values Rustenburg instils in its learners: leadership, service and integrity. We are immensely proud of Hannah Hussey, whose work not only advances public health but also inspires the next generation of women to pursue meaningful, impactful careers.

E04 Kadeeja Basier

Leadership in Finance and Beyond



Kadeeja Basier (E04), an accomplished leader in the financial sector exemplifies Rustenburg's values of leadership, integrity and service and inspires both learners and alumnae to pursue excellence in all areas of life.

Kadeeja is the Chief Operating Officer at Ninety One, serving on the executive management team and overseeing operations, technology and product development. Since joining in 2008, she has held several leadership roles, including Head of Product and Strategic Change, showcasing her vision and adaptability.

A qualified actuary and Fellow of the Institute of Actuaries, with a Business Science degree in Actuarial Science from UCT, Kadeeja combines technical expertise with strategic leadership to drive innovation in financial services.

Beyond her career, she is a dedicated mother and recently became involved in a non-profit that reflects her values as a Muslim feminist, underlining her commitment to community and social impact.

E20 Kim Buchholtz

Advancing Sports Physiotherapy on a Global Stage



Rustenburg proudly spotlights Kim Buchholtz (E2000), a trailblazer in sports physiotherapy whose career has combined clinical excellence, research, education and international service.

After matriculating from Rustenburg, Kim studied at the University of Cape Town, graduating with a BSc in Physiotherapy (2005) and later an MPhil in Sports Physiotherapy (2013). She began her career in private practice before opening her own orthopaedic and sports physiotherapy practice in 2009, which she successfully ran until 2018. Alongside her clinical work, Kim lectured at UCT from 2012, becoming a co-course convenor of the MSc in Exercise and Sport Physiotherapy in 2016, while also supervising numerous undergraduate and postgraduate dissertations.

Her expertise extended beyond academia. Kim served as head physiotherapist for the Australian Blind Cricket Team, travelling to World Cups in South Africa (2014), India (2017) and the UAE (2018). In recognition of her impact, she was named one of the Mail & Guardian's 200 Young South Africans in Health (2018). She has also shared her knowledge on global platforms by presenting at major conferences in Europe, the Middle East and South Africa and earning citations for her many publications.

In 2019, Kim joined LUNEX International University of Applied Sciences in Luxembourg, where she is now a Senior Lecturer in musculoskeletal physiotherapy She is also the programme leader for the Bachelor in Physiotherapy. She completed her PhD in Exercise Science in 2021, has taken on senior leadership roles at LUNEX and was awarded the Excellence in Teaching Award (2022). Kim's journey reflects a commitment to advancing physiotherapy education, research and practice worldwide.

"Rustenburg Girls' High School has been ranked 3rd nationally in the Quintile 5 category at the National Education Excellence Awards. This recognition reflects the dedication of our staff, the hard work of our learners and the unwavering support of our community.

Sustainability remains a priority. Our solar power system is now fully operational, reducing reliance on Eskom and ensuring continuity during load shedding. To date, we have reduced our carbon footprint by a total of 19 738 kg of CO2.

The WCED-funded roof repairs are now complete. *Naturally Slate*, the contractor, has done a beautiful job. As a recognised heritage site, RGHS is receiving careful restoration.



In August, the Rustenburg Marimba Band joined a historic Guinness World Record attempt for the largest marimba performance in the world. With 1,177 musicians, the Cape Town ensemble more than doubled the previous record. A Guinness representative from the UK confirmed the achievement and we are proud to have been part of this extraordinary event.

For the 25th year, RGHS entered the Holocaust Centre's Creative Competition. Our Grade 11 History learners submitted a record number of entries and achieved top awards across categories, including Art, Writing, Documentary Film and Website.
